The people of Berkeley built themselves a park on a piece of land which did not belong to them and simply justified their actions to the city and university with the words: 'We are using the land better than you used it: It's ours!'(Frank Bardacke). Besides the political impact of this event, the residents of Berkeley created a public space out of corporate land with their own hands and their own ideas. Their park was supposed to symbolize everything they had fought for in the last decade, especially the right to free speech and their idea of the equality of all humans. The...
